Greyt health & safety

6 most common dog health problems

Our dogs are faithful companions, and they depend on us for good care. To help your canine friend live a healthy life, you should know some of the most common health problems dogs face, their signs, and what you can do about them.

Dogs and ear infections

Ear infections are a common canine health problem, and they can be caused by allergies, yeast, ear mites, bacteria, hair growth deep in the ear canal, and more. Symptoms your dog may have with an ear infection include:

- Head shaking or head tilting
- Ear odor
- Vigorous scratching
- Lack of balance
- Unusual back-and-forth eye movements



- Redness of the ear canal
- Swelling of the outer portion of the ear
- Brown, yellow, or bloody discharge

Always take your dog to the veterinarian if you think they have an ear infection. In most cases, cleaning and medicating the ear canal will quickly clear up an infection. However, surgery can be needed for chronic infections or if forceful head shaking results in the rupture of a vessel within the outer part of the ear. This is called a hematoma.

Dogs and worms

Tapeworms, roundworms, hookworms, and whipworms are common internal parasites in dogs. And although any worm infestation can make your pooch uncomfortable, some, like hookworms, can be fatal in puppies. Signs your dog may have worms include:

- Diarrhea (may be bloody)
- Weight loss
- A change in appetite
- A rough, dry coat
- Scooting on their bottom
- Vomiting (with roundworms in particular)
- An overall poor appearance
- Small segments of tapeworm (resembling grains of rice) in his stool

The best way to diagnose a worm problem is with a visit to the vet. Treatment depends on which type of worm your dog has, but generally includes an oral medication and may require follow-up. Don't try treating worms yourself: A medication that kills

roundworms, for example, may not kill tapeworms.

When fleas find your dog

It takes just three weeks for one flea to turn into an infestation of 1,000 biting bugs. A very common canine health problem, fleas are easy for your dog to pick up, but they're also easy to treat. Signs your dog may have fleas include:

- Excessive scratching, licking or biting at the skin
- Hair loss
- Hot spots
- Allergy dermatitis (allergic response caused by contact with flea saliva)
- Tapeworms (which are carried by fleas)
- Flea dirt (looks like small black dots) against your dog's skin

Untreated, fleas not only make your dog intensely uncomfortable, they can also cause allergic reactions, infections, and even lead to anemia from blood loss.

collars, oral medicine, shampoos, sprays, or topical liquids.

How to help hot spots in your dog

They're commonly known as hot spots, but the medical term for those bare, inflamed, red areas you often see on dogs is acute moist dermatitis—a bacterial skin infection. Anything that irritates your dog's skin enough to make them scratch or chew can lead to the pain and itch of hot spots, which, if left untreated, can quickly grow larger.

A hot spot's location can help your vet diagnose its cause. Fleas, for example, may be the source of a hip hot spot, while a hot spot at the ear might point to ear problems.

Treating hot spots may involve shaving and cleaning the irritated area, using antibiotics, anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs), steroids, allergy medications like cytopoint or Apoquel, or topical medications, depending on how bad the hot spots are, and how much pain your pooch is in.

Vomiting

Vomiting is a common dog health problem, with dozens of possible causes, from infection or intestinal parasites to pancreatitis, kidney failure, heatstroke, an obstruction in the stomach or intestine, or poisoning.

Symptoms are basic: abdominal heaving and drooling caused by nausea. If your dog also has diarrhea, blood in the vomit, seems lethargic, continues vomiting, or can't hold down liquids, contact your vet right away to prevent life-threatening dehydration.

Treatment depends on what's causing a dog's distress, and may include fluid therapy, drugs to control vomiting, surgery for obstructions, and homemade foods like well-cooked skinless chicken, boiled potatoes, and rice.

Doggy diarrhea

Diarrhea in dogs, as with vomiting, can have lots of causes, including stress, infections like parvo virus, intestinal parasites, and food problems.

Diarrhea symptoms are pretty obvious look for loose, watery, or liquid stool.

Because diarrhea can easily lead to dehydration, be sure your dog has plenty of clean water available, then take your pooch to the vet if the diarrhea persists for more than a day, or immediately if there's also fever, lethargy, vomiting, dark or bloody stools, or loss of appetite.

Household products that are poisonous for pets

If you've ever had a toddler in your home, you know that baby proofing the house is



a basic safety requirement. Think of your pets as permanent toddlers! Keeping your furry family members safe from exposure to household products and chemicals that can be toxic is important. Almost every family has products in their home that can cause problems in dogs and cats like gastrointestinal upset (vomiting and/or diarrhea). Other products—some that might surprise you—can even cause more serious problems like seizures, liver or kidney failure, and lead to death if not treated quickly once your pet has come into contact with or ingested them. But don't worry—it's easy to keep your pets safe with a bit of planning, careful reading of product labels, and attention to detail.

What kinds of household products can be poisonous to your pets?

Almost any household product can be dangerous to your pet, even those labeled "safe" or "natural," including homemade products. While in many cases the product's ingredients are the dangerous component, your pet can also be at risk depending on the amount of the product they are exposed to or the way in which they're exposed. All of the following have the potential to cause harm and should be avoided or, if used in or around the home, stored with extreme care:

- Antifreeze, de-icer
- Bleach or bleach-based cleaners
- Carpet or rug cleaner/shampoo/ deodorizer
- Essential oils
- Plant fertilizer
- Glue, other adhesives
- Laundry or dishwasher detergent
- Paint, solvents, spackle
- Rat/mouse/slug bait or other insecticides

- Vinegar (plain or mixed with water)
- Window cleaner

Hazardous ingredients to avoid in household products

Some ingredients are best avoided altogether. If you see these ingredients on the product label, it's safest not to use them around your pets:

- Chlorine bleach
- Phthalates—can be listed on the label simply as "fragrance"
- Ammonia

- Glycol Ethers (for example, ethylene glycol in antifreeze)
- Formaldehyde
- Benzalkonium Chloride (most commonly found in household disinfectants)

How pets come into contact with poisonous products in your home

Pets can be exposed to toxic household products in several ways, all of which can lead to poisoning or toxicity:

> Ingestion Dogs and cats have a tendency to eat first and ask questions later. Licking, chewing on, or swallowing the wrong product can result in toxicity.

- Direct contact Pets can absorb toxins through their skin even if they have a thick haircoat. In addition, if a pet gets something hazardous on their coat or paws and then licks it, they can ingest the poison.
- Inhalation Similar to humans, dogs and cats are at risk of irritation or damage to their respiratory system (from their nose all the way down to their lungs) if exposed to things like certain chemicals, essentials oils and perfumes, paint, and gasoline fumes.
- Secondary ingestion
 If your pet finds a mouse or rat that
 has been poisoned by rodenticide
 (mouse/rat poison) and your pet
 eats that rodent, they can be
 exposed to the toxin and be at risk
 of being poisoned themselves.

Keeping pets safe from common household products that might be poisonous

Even the most careful pet owner is often no match for a curious cat who can open cabinets or a dog who can reach the countertop. A little extra planning can go a long way to keeping your pet safe:

- Always check the product label
 This is where you'll find safety
 warnings about the product's
 toxicity and what to do if it is
 ingested or comes into contact with
 skin. These warnings don't need
 to be specific to animals—if it is
 - dangerous to humans, itis likely dangerous to your pets.

• Natural doesn't mean safe Even if something is labeled natural, it is best to consult a trusted resource or veterinary professional to confirm that the product is safe.

- Look for pet-safe products
 There are cleaners and disinfectants
 on the market that are designed
 to be safer for pets. Keep an eye
 out for "pet safe" on the label. But
 remember, not all products will
 state if they are safe for pets and
 even those that do might not be
 completely safe. Always consult a
 trusted veterinary resource prior to
 using one of these products.
- Keep household products stored securely

Store products in cupboards or cabinets up high where pets cannot reach them and secure them with a lock whenever possible. Child safety locks are recommended, especially for storage locations within reach of your pet (like under the sink).

 Never leave your pet alone in the garage

Many household toxins are stored in the garage, increasing the danger for your pet if they spend unsupervised time out



there. Consider storing potentially hazardous products in a locked cabinet even within the garage.

- Don't switch containers
 Never store a household product
 in a container other than the one
 it came in (like a food or beverage
 container instead of the original
 packaging). It's important to have
 the correct label to reference in case
 of an emergency and for proper
 storage and use in general.
- Avoid pet food/water or sleeping areas

Do not store, spray, or use household cleaners, essential oils, or pesticides anywhere near your pet's food and water bowls or areas where they spend a lot of time resting or sleeping.

- Watch out for odor removers and scented products
 If a product makes broad claims about removing odors or is strongly fragranced, avoid using it around your pet. This usually means the product contains phthalates or other potentially dangerous chemical components.
- Let wet areas dry When cleaning the carpet or using hard surface floor cleaners, do not let your pet walk on or sleep in the space until the surface is totally dry and there is no product odor left.
- Keep your pets indoors When fertilizing outside, keep your pets inside and follow label instructions regarding use around pets.

In case of exposure, your first call should be to the ASPCA Poison Control or Pet Poison Helpline. Both hotlines are available 24/7 for poison-related help specific to your pets. If your pet collapses, loses consciousness, has a seizure, or has difficulty breathing, that is an emergency—please take them directly to the nearest veterinary hospital for immediate evaluation.

Even the household products we typically think of as safe and familiar can pose a risk to your pet if they are exposed. A bit of common sense and planning for how you use and store a product go a long way to prevent dangerous exposure for your dog or cat. When using cleaning products and other products in your home, it is always safest to keep your pet out of the room until you are finished. Before allowing your pet back in, ensure all surfaces are dry, and the air is free from the product's odor. When in doubt, err on the side of caution to keep your furry family members safe and healthy!

Larger flea surge predicted this year; How to keep fleas out of your yard

Higher temperatures than usual this winter means the surge of fleas is predicted to be larger this spring and summer.

However, with some proactive measures homeowners can make yards flea-free for pets. The Humane Society of Greater Dayton recommends the following steps to keep fleas at bay:

Frequent mowing: Fleas thrive in shaded areas, as they cannot withstand prolonged exposure to sunlight. By mowing your lawn regularly, you expose the soil to the sun, making it less hospitable for fleas to inhabit. Plus, a well-manicured lawn adds to the overall aesthetics of your yard!

Control moisture levels: Fleas love humid environments, so it's crucial to avoid over-watering your lawn. Keeping your yard dry and well-drained makes it less attractive to these persistent pests. Be mindful of any areas where water tends to accumulate, such as low-lying spots or areas with poor drainage.

Use pet-safe insecticides: Treat dog runs and other outdoor areas with petsafe insecticides to deter fleas. These products can help create a barrier against fleas, making your yard a less desirable habitat for them to thrive. Always follow the instructions carefully when applying insecticides to ensure the safety of your pets and the environment.

Thoroughly rake debris: Regularly rake your yard to remove any debris, such as leaves, grass clippings, or fallen branches. This not only improves the overall appearance of your lawn but also exposes fleas to potential insecticides and eliminates their hiding spots. Pay close attention to shaded areas under bushes or trees, as these are common flea breeding grounds.

Rodent control: Rodents like mice and opossums can carry fleas into your yard, creating a perfect storm for infestation. Take steps to keep rodents away from your home by storing food in sealed containers, removing outdoor clutter, and sealing up any entry points into your house.

Limit contact with wild animals: Wild and stray animals often harbor fleas, which can easily transfer to your pets. Keep stray animals at bay by securely storing pet food and minimizing your pet's interactions with wildlife. By reducing contact with potential flea carriers, you can lower the risk of infestation in your yard.

Consistency is key when it comes to flea control, so make these practices a regular yard maintenance routine.

For added security, protect pets from fleas and ticks with preventive care now from your local veterinarian, or by calling for an appointment at the Dayton Humane Veterinary Hospital at 937-965-4399.


