Greyt health & safety

Dogs and skunks


Signs and symptoms

If your dog has been sprayed by a skunk, the first thing you notice will likely be the smell. However, there are several other symptoms or problems your pet may exhibit if sprayed by a skunk:

- Drooling
- Vomiting
- Red and/or swollen eyes
- Rolling
- Face rubbing
- Sneezing
- Temporary blindness

These signs are typically seen immediately or within a couple of hours of your pet being sprayed. Symptoms like lethargy, weakness, change in urine color, and pale or brown gums may take up to a few hours or even days to appear. These symptoms are rarer, but if they appear, you should take your pet to a veterinarian right away. The compounds in skunk spray are irritating and, in some cases, can result in damage to a dog's red blood cells, potentially leading to anemia.

Steps to take

What should you do if your pet has been sprayed by a skunk? The first order of business should be a bath—but regular shampoo is not going to cut it! Create a mixture out of the following ingredients:

- 1 quart (4 cups) of 3% fresh hydrogen peroxide
- ¼ cup baking soda
- 1-2 teaspoons of liquid soap (dishwashing detergent)

Lather your pet in this mixture and wait five minutes, then rinse with copious amounts of water. Repeat if necessary. It is possible this may bleach your pet's hair, but it is not toxic to their skin. Note that this mixture doesn't store well, so you will need to make a fresh batch if your pet gets sprayed again.

If your pet's eyes seem to be affected, rinsing them with copious amounts of tepid water for 20 minutes may relieve some discomfort.

Prevention is key

No one wants their pet to be sprayed by a skunk. Fortunately, there are many things you can do to discourage skunks from coming near your home:

- Make sure there is no easy access to pet food or bird seed. Use wellsealed containers and latched lids when necessary.
- Remove or prevent access to wood piles and areas underneath decks and houses, where skunks like to den.
- Invest in motion-activated lights or sprinklers, as skunks do not like light or noise.

 Sprinkle kitty litter in front of a suspected den or hole, or stuff paper, leaves or straw into the hole to let the skunks know that it is not a good place for them.

In the United States, skunks can be carriers of rabies. If you suspect your pet has been bitten by a skunk, it is best to contact a veterinarian right away.

Nestlé Purina Petcare Company voluntarily recalls Purina Pro Plan Veterinary Diets El Elemental Dry Dog Food in the U.S. due to potentially elevated vitamin D

Nestlé Purina PetCare Company is voluntarily recalling select lots of Purina Pro Plan Veterinary Diets EL Elemental (PPVD EL) prescription dry dog food due to potentially elevated levels of vitamin D. Vitamin D is an essential nutrient for dogs; however, ingestion of elevated levels can lead to health issues depending on the level of vitamin D and the length of exposure. Vitamin D toxicity may include vomiting, loss of appetite, increased thirst, increased urination, and excessive drooling to renal (kidney) dysfunction.

Purina is taking this action after receiving two contacts about two separate confirmed cases of a dog exhibiting signs of vitamin D toxicity after consuming the diet, to date. Once taken off the diet, each of these dogs recovered.

The affected dry dog food was distributed throughout the United States by prescription only through veterinary clinics, Purina Vet Direct, Purina for Professionals, and other select retailers with the ability to validate a prescription.



The FDA periodically updates their website with new pet food recalls. Don't take a chance with your pet's health. Please visit the FDA website to check the safety of your pet's food.





Photo submissions for 2024 calendars

We will be taking submissions for the 2024 GAGC calendar from March 1 through April 30.

> If you have a favorite candid shot of your hound family members, submit up to three photos by no later than April 30; the pictures will then be voted on in May. Once the picture votes have been tallied, we will provide them to the printers and the calendars should be ready by the annual fall event. We usually start taking orders over the

Also, we are taking submissions for the name of the calendar. Previous names were Huggable Hounds, A Year of Greytness, Need to know information:

- 1. Picture size is important. We can do some resizing of pictures; however, if the picture is quite small or quite large, it may be difficult to get good quality resolution. Based upon printing experts' recommendations, please set your camera on the HIGHEST resolution possible when snapping shots of your greyhounds.
- Pictures in landscape form (instead of portrait) are more likely to make the month photos (as opposed to the collages) in the calendar design. Don't worry—portrait photos can be submitted.
- 3. Candid, everyday shots are preferred. We avoid professional pictures for two reasons: 1. We don't want to get into any problems with copyright or artistic infringement, and 2. We want an even playing field for the pooches. Below are some suggestions that have done well over the years.
 - Holidays: Any holiday (Christmas, Hanukkah, Easter, Valentine's, Birthday, Cinco de Mayo, etc.) are great for the calendar.

- Seasonal: If you have a great shot of the beach, the snow, autumn leaves, throw it in.
- Quirky shots: Cockroaching, weird expressions, funny ears, etc.
- Cuteness: so cute you can't stand it (big eyes, cuddling, the type of shots that made you adopt the dog(s) in the first place).
- Picture formats: Electronic formats

 (.jpg or other similar format) are
 preferred. However, we will also take
 print submissions:
 - if the quality of the photo is good (because we will have to scan in later)

AND

- the print is a copy, not an original. (In the case of print submissions, we will endeavor to get them back to you. However, just to be safe, we would rather be responsible for only a copy.)
- 5. Please limit your photo submissions to three (3) per household. If you have more and you would like *Angie* to choose, just indicate it in the email.
- 6. If you submitted pictures last year and your picture was selected for the calendar, please do not resubmit those pictures. If you submitted pictures that did not make the calendar, feel free to resubmit those pictures for voting.
- 7. Please provide your hound(s)' names and, if more than one in the picture, indicate which name goes with which hound. This is very important as the dog(s) names appear in the calendar with their pictures.

Alan, our Nature's Select distributor and GAGC member, gave Brenda a new product to try on her **Hawkeye**'s corns called Skin & Paw Releaf, a topical made by Pet Releaf.

From Brenda: Most of you know my poor **Hawkeye** has several corns on each foot. I'm able to remove them every couple of weeks giving him a little pain relief. I have been applying this product from Alan once daily for about three or four weeks now and he started showing signs of improved walking after a couple weeks. The last couple weeks he has been running in the yard, up and down the steps and trying to play in the house (he's kind of a bully, and I think my other dogs preferred him just watching them play). Anyway, I can tell he is in way less pain now and honestly, I think the corns are getting smaller and easier to remove. If your greyhound has dry cracked pads or corns you might want to give this product a try. Thank you, Alan (www.nsdayton.com).


Dog runs, fosters & adoptions

Dog runs

Jan. 22 was a snowy day with messy roads when both *Brenda* and *Mel* and *Jon* met our W.V. contact in Jackson to get five new dogs. They picked up three boys: **Stevey Octane**, **Atascocita Nemo**, and **Crocket**; and two girls: **Hi's Ali** and **JS Dustinthewind** (**Kansas**). Here's *Brenda*'s account:

When I start preparing for a dog run, besides getting available foster homes, file folders, paperwork, combo leads and tag collars ready, food, coats, meds, etc. and special treats for our dog source and sometimes treats for her kennel dogs; I also watch the weather forecast daily. Well, the

weatherman let me down this time. Listening to them and watching the radar, the snowstorm was supposed to go northeast around Columbus and was to be maybe an inch of snow. WRONG! Mel and Jon and I ventured out when it first started snowing hoping it would stop. This became the worst road conditions I've ever driven in! When we got to Jackson, fortunately it was only rain. We picked up five gorgeous retired racers; the boys peed, but the girls had no interest, so we started our trip back home. Jon and Mel took the three boys, and I took the two little girls. Well, Kansas thought she should be in my lap to help me drive. She climbed through the dog gate not once but three times, making my drive even more difficult. I honestly think she was either hungry or had to pee. In more than 20 years of dog hauls, I've never had a dog go through the gate before. Our greyt foster families were waiting for us when we returned; they all grabbed a dog, meds, coat and food, starting the dog on its new chapter of life!

Jon reported the following:

With the heavy snow, the dog run on Sunday was nerve-racking and longer than usual. I-71 was quite a mess. Fortunately, things began to change about 45 minutes after exiting onto 32 East. The snow turned to rain which was not ideal, but better than snow and ice. The pups were very excited once out of the hauler and had to be held tightly. We walked them around a little then loaded them into the van.

The smell of three wet dogs fresh from the track was quite pungent for the longer-than-usual drive back to *Ron* and *Brenda's*. All the pups were pretty relaxed and either looked out the windows or plopped on the floor. The roads were a bit sketchy, but *Mel* had no issues driving. The foster families were all ready and waiting for when we arrived. All three boys are very handsome and should be wonderful additions to new homes.





We took him to the Pines to get cremated. I cannot believe I will have to pee by myself now and that he won't stick his nose up my butt when I come home. I won't see him at the door waiting for me. And I won't see his butt trotting to the yard to go to the bathroom. I'll never hear his groans when I rub his ears. I won't feel his soft fur. He won't be on the couch in his normal spot. My mom and I are heartbroken. But we are so thankful we had him for seven short years. We loved him dearly.
