

Greyt health & safety

Dogs and skunks

We included this article in our GAGC newsletter last February, but skunks have been seen out and about recently so you may find it useful.

Signs and symptoms

If your dog has been sprayed by a skunk, the first thing you notice will likely be the smell. However, there are several other symptoms or problems your pet may exhibit if sprayed by a skunk:

- Drooling
- Vomiting
- Red and/or swollen eyes
- Rolling
- Face rubbing
- Sneezing
- Temporary blindness

These signs are typically seen immediately or within a couple of hours of your pet being sprayed. Symptoms like lethargy, weakness, change in urine color, and pale or brown gums may take up to a few hours or even days to appear. These symptoms are rarer, but if they appear,

you should take your pet to a veterinarian right away. The compounds in skunk spray are irritating and, in some cases, can result in damage to a dog's red blood cells, potentially leading to anemia.

Steps to take

What should you do if your pet has been sprayed by a skunk? The first order of business should be a bath—but regular shampoo is not going to cut it! Create a mixture out of the following ingredients:

- 1 quart (4 cups) of 3% fresh hydrogen peroxide
- ¼ cup baking soda
- 1-2 teaspoons of liquid soap (dishwashing detergent)

Lather your pet in this mixture and wait five minutes, then rinse with copious amounts of water. Repeat if necessary. It is possible this may bleach your pet's hair, but it is not toxic to their skin. Note that this mixture doesn't store well, so you will need to make a fresh batch if your pet gets sprayed again.

If your pet's eyes seem to be affected, rinsing them with copious amounts of tepid water for 20 minutes may relieve some discomfort.

Prevention is key

No one wants their pet to be sprayed by a skunk. Fortunately, there are many things you can do to discourage skunks from coming near your home:

- Make sure there is no easy access to pet food or bird seed. Use wellsealed containers and latched lids when necessary.
- Remove or prevent access to

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wood piles and areas underneath decks and houses, where skunks like to den.

- Invest in motion-activated lights or sprinklers, as skunks do not like light or noise.
- Sprinkle kitty litter in front of a suspected den or hole, or stuff paper, leaves or straw into the hole to let the skunks know that it is not a good place for them.

In the United States, skunks can be carriers of rabies. If you suspect your pet has been bitten by a skunk, it is best to contact a veterinarian right away.

Caring for a senior dog

There's something special about caring for a senior dog. They've lived and learned a lot by this point. If they've been with you a while, you likely know each other well and have routines that bring you both comfort and joy. Aging also means your dog has changing needs. With proper attention and preparation,

you can help them move more easily through their senior years.

What age is a dog considered a senior?

When to classify a dog as a senior depends on their size, breed, genetics, and environmental conditions. Large breed dogs age more quickly than small breeds and are typically considered to be senior at about 6 to 7 years old. Small breeds aren't considered a senior until they are 9 or 10 years old and medium breeds when they are 8 to 9 years old. When age-related issues start to set in, regardless of your pet's actual age, they are a senior.

Physical and behavioral changes in senior dogs

As your dog enters their golden years, you may notice a few changes.

Appearance:

- Their facial fur will begin to turn gray
- They may lose weight or gain weight more readily

Behavior:

- You may see changes in the social relationships between your senior dog, the family, and other pets
- There may be changes in their eating and drinking habits
- Your once active dog may now be content to take it easy due to changes in mobility

Tips to help your senior dog around the home

There are some simple ways to make your home more comfortable for your senior pup:

Put down runners or mats on slippery floors to provide more traction and

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
prevent slipping

- Keep your dog's nails and fur around their paw pads trimmed. Proper nail length gives them more traction and grip as they walk and prevents discomfort from overly long nails
- Train your dog to use a ramp or small stairs to get onto and off of furniture so they don't jump up or off
- Make sure they have lots of comfy and easily accessible resting places.
 Many senior dogs appreciate orthopedic dog beds or mats to ease achy joints

Medical changes in senior dogs

Besides the obvious physical and behavioral changes that occur from aging, there are also internal changes. Every organ system is affected by the aging process. Over time, organs begin to wear out and are susceptible to progressive damage. This is why your senior dog needs to have a check-up at least twice a year. The earlier issues are recognized and treated the more

successful treatment will be, giving your dog a better quality of life for longer.

The most common health issues tend to be:

- Hearing loss
- Vision loss
- Cognitive dysfunction/dementia
- Arthritis

Helping your senior dog through common medical issues

Hearing loss

As dogs age, they can gradually lose their hearing due to degeneration of the nerves in the ear. Unfortunately, there is nothing that can stop the process or prevent your dog from becoming deaf.

Since hearing loss is often gradual, the signs can go unnoticed. Early indications of hearing loss include:

- Not responding to commands
- Startling more easily
- Not noticing when people enter the room
- Not waking until touched
- Not responding to sudden noises

Some things you can do to help your dog adapt include:

- Teaching commands using hand signals
- Creating vibrations, such as lightly stomping feet, when you enter a room
- Turning lights on and off when entering a room
- Staying in their line of sight as you exit a room so they are aware you left
- Training them to your smell with a specific perfume or cologne
- Desensitizing them so they are

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comfortable with unexpected touching. For instance, immediately reward your dog with a treat when you touch them on the back gently

- Keeping them on a leash when on a walk
- Securing your yard since they can't hear potential danger approaching
- Always having ID on your dog that states they are deaf

Vision loss

Just as humans have vision loss as they age, so do dogs. It can occur gradually or suddenly. There are several causes of blindness in dogs.

- Cataracts (gradual)
- Glaucoma (usually gradual)
- Progressive retinal atrophy (gradual)
- Sudden acquired retinal degeneration (SARDS) (sudden)

If you notice any of the following signs, you should have your dog's sight evaluated by a veterinarian:

- Bumping into things
- Avoidance of stairs
- Anxiousness in or avoiding new places

- Cloudy eyes
- Redness of the eye
- Redness and swelling of tissue surrounding the eye

Using their other senses, your dog can maneuver well through life. However, to make things easier for them, there are a few things you can do.

- Wear and have other pets wear tags or bells make noise so your dog knows where everyone is
- Keep pathways in the house wide and absent of any obstacles
- Create a walking routine for them to find their bed, food bowls, door, etc.
 Do not move furniture or other items once this is established
- Be aware of anything that could harm your dog at their level, such as table corners, and safety proof them
- Train voice cues to indicate when they're approaching some type of obstacle or hindrance. For example, say "step" when they're approaching stairs
- Consider using a special "bumper" type collar attachment to help prevent them from running into furniture or obstacles
- Be sure to keep them on a leash when outdoors
- Have proper ID tags that state your dog is blind

If your senior dog appears suddenly blind, this could be an emergency. Seek veterinary care immediately.

Cognitive Dysfunction Syndrome (CDS)/Dementia

Dogs can lose their cognitive function as they age. This means they are unable to process information about their

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environment or determine how to act. About 28% of dogs 11 to 12 years old have CDS, and this number increases to 68% for dogs 15 to 16 years old.

In the early stages, signs are subtle but with time become severe. Some common signs include:

- Disorientation
- Whining/barking for no reason
- Pacing
- Bathroom accidents
- Standing in corners
- Abnormal sleep habits
- Changes in family interactions

These may also be indicators of other health issues. Therefore, consulting with a veterinarian is important for a proper diagnosis.

CDS has no cure, but there are specialized diets, medications, and supplements that have been found to be beneficial.

Arthritis

Arthritis is a slow and progressive disorder that can begin as early as one



year of age. While inflammation is one of the primary causes of arthritis, obesity is one of the more common causes of chronic inflammation and extra stress on the joints—particularly with senior dogs.

While there is no cure, there are several things you can do to help slow the progression of arthritis and improve your dog's quality of life.

- Maintain your dog at an ideal body weight
- Exercise them regularly
- Joint supplements
- Prescription diets for arthritis
- Cold laser therapy
- Acupuncture
- Pain medications
- Physical therapy



Pet food recalls

The FDA periodically updates their website with new pet food recalls. Don't take a chance with your pet's health. Please visit the <u>FDA website</u> to check the safety of your pet's food.

Yahoo email issues

Photo submissions for 2025 calendars

We will be taking submissions for the 2025 GAGC calendar from March 1 through April 30.

> If you have a favorite candid shot of your hound family members, submit up to three photos by no later than April 30; the pictures will then be voted on in May. Once the picture votes have been tallied, we will provide them to the printers and the calendars should be ready by the annual fall event. We usually start taking orders over the summer.

Also, we are taking submissions for the name of the calendar. Previous names were Huggable Hounds, A Year of Greytness, and Greyt Expectations. We will vote on the new name at the May picnic.

In addition, the calendar will have a Memory page for all of those greyt friends who have crossed over the Rainbow Bridge. If you have a grey you would like to include, please send *Angie* their name and memorial date (and a picture if you like, just follow the submission guidelines below). This year, we will take submissions for those who crossed starting in June 2023 through May 2024.

Need to know information:

- Picture size is important. We can do some resizing of pictures; however, if the picture is quite small or quite large, it may be difficult to get good quality resolution. Based upon printing experts' recommendations, please set your camera on the HIGHEST resolution possible when snapping shots of your greyhounds.
- Pictures in landscape form (instead of portrait) are more likely to make the month photos (as opposed to the collages) in the calendar design. Don't worry—portrait photos can be submitted.
- Candid, everyday shots are preferred. We avoid professional pictures for two reasons: 1. We don't want to get into any problems with copyright or artistic infringement, and 2. We want an even playing field for the pooches. Below are some suggestions that have done well over the years.
 - Holidays: Any holiday (Christmas, Hanukkah, Easter, Valentine's, Birthday, Cinco de Mayo, etc.) are great for the calendar.
 - Seasonal: If you have a great shot of the beach, the snow, autumn leaves, throw it in.
 - Quirky shots: Cockroaching, weird

Here are examples of the kinds of great photos that could be submitted for the calendar contest. expressions, funny ears, etc.

- Cuteness: so cute you can't stand it (big eyes, cuddling, the type of shots that made you adopt the dog(s) in the first place).
- Picture formats: Electronic formats

 (.jpg or other similar format) are
 preferred. However, we will also take
 print submissions:
 - if the quality of the photo is good (because we will have to scan in later)

AND

- the print is a copy, not an original. (In the case of print submissions, we will endeavor to get them back to you. However, just to be safe, we would rather be responsible for only a copy.)
- 5. Please limit your photo submissions to three (3) per household. If you have more and you would like *Angie* to choose, just indicate it in the email.
- If you submitted pictures last year and your picture was selected for the calendar, please do not resubmit those pictures. If you submitted pictures that did not make the calendar, feel free to resubmit those pictures for voting.
- 7. Please provide your hound(s)' names and, if more than one in the picture, indicate which name goes with which hound. This is very important as the dog(s) names appear in the calendar with their pictures.


Dog runs, fosters & adoptions

Dog runs

On Dec. 31, *Brenda* and *Leslie* rode together to Jackson to pick up five girls: **CET Gentle Jen, CET Panda, CET Black Pepper, Super C Dove**, and **Solomon Selika**, all packed into *Brenda*'s car. Here's what *Leslie* wrote about the experience:

The dog run was so much fun! The five girls were pretty well behaved. When we were about 40 minutes away from *Brenda's*, **Dove** decided she wanted to ride shotgun in my lap. She wiggled her way through the gate and came up front. She's a very laid-back girl. She just wanted to be up front!



Sully (Pat C Erwin)


July 18, 2011 – Feb. 1, 2024

Sully was 8½ years old when he was surrendered to GAGC at the beginning of the pandemic. I was his foster mom. Several days after his arrival, during the last turnout of the night, my pack flushed a rabbit which darted under the gate. **Sully** didn't know the yard that well and slammed headfirst into the metal, knocking himself out. The impact led to brain swelling and a massive stroke, then five days at *Dr. Moore*'s clinic while we waited to hear if he'd live or die. He definitely lived, eventually rebounding about 90% from the stroke. I adopted him and we worked together for the next several months doing rehab and getting him strong enough to walk on his own again.

Sully, aka **Sully Man**, was such a gentle soul, cuddling with my other greyhounds, welcoming all greyhound visitors with his sweet disposition. He never met a human he didn't like and was very connected to me. He was a master roacher, sleeping upside down most nights. He loved ear scrunchies which caused happy moans and groans.

Eventually the damage from the stroke caught up with him and his back end became very weak and extremely painful, despite daily medication. It took me a while to acknowledge that it was time to say goodbye, but now he's finally out of pain. I let him go on Feb. 1, four years after the stroke. He was a fighter and I loved him. Sadly, I still find myself looking for #5 at turnouts.
